

### **Our Vicar writes**

Greetings my brothers and sisters in Christ. I trust and pray that you are all well.

I write this in the immediate aftermath of the unexpected passing of our dear Lois Shallard. As sad as her passing is, the overwhelming outpouring of grief and support is very comforting and reminds us of how loved



she was. It also highlights the importance of being a part of a faith community and playing an active role in that community.

Lois led by example. She certainly lived her faith and consequently many people were blessed and experienced first-hand the transformative power of Jesus Christ because an ordinary person did the ordinary things extraordinarily well. Jesus is not looking for super saints. Jesus is not looking for supremely gifted Christians. Jesus wants you and me to be faithful and generous with our love and time in our community. A vital part of this lifestyle is to be an active member and participant in the life of the church.

I have always been very interested in politics and the role of the church in that realm. Growing up in apartheid South Africa certainly kept this front and centre as the church and the state were constantly in conflict over racist legislation and the abuse of human rights. The church was a powerful force in the dismantling of that regime. But, sadly, for a long time it was also a powerful force in propping up that regime. This must serve as a reminder to all of us that our interpretation of the scriptures is very important. Good can be manipulated for evil. "Be alert and of sober mind. Your enemy the devil prowls around like a roaring lion looking for someone to devour" (1 Peter 5:8). A battle is being fought for your soul and it begins by trying to wrest control of your mind. "For as a man thinks in his heart, so is he" (Proverbs 23:7). It is my opinion that the church cannot and must not remain silent in the affairs of the nation and local community. I was reminded of this when the Bishop of Washington Cathedral bravely challenged Donald Trump to be a kind and compassionate President of the USA. She reminded him that he himself believes that God saved him from an assassin's bullet so that he may lead the nation. The backlash was swift from many quarters as it always will be, but that must not deter us from being the prophetic voice in civic affairs. One of the great lies of the devil is that the church should not involve itself in the affairs of the state. This gives evil people free reign to approve legislation that deprives people of their dignity and an equal chance to make good in life by affording equal opportunity to all people. At its worst, it openly classifies some as inferior to others (e.g. Apartheid, the Nazis and slavery).

The hardening of attitudes along racial lines in our country is deeply concerning. The church (the Anglican Church in particular) played an important role in the signing of the Treaty of Waitangi and it still has an important role to play in finding a way forward for the nation. We cannot abdicate this responsibility. All of us must pray for all of those who are trying to find common ground, we must pray for respectful and honest dialogue and also that the rhetoric is not as inflammatory as it has become. This is a time for peaceful, respectful nation building and you and I are a part of this process. Let us choose our words carefully when standing around the bbq or any other social gathering.

We also have a role to play at the local level. I see that the mayoral candidates are beginning to announce themselves. God cares deeply for Gore and Districts. Who is the right candidate? This is something that we must commit to prayer. Our prayers will be far more effective if we stay informed. Last Wednesday was Ash Wednesday. May I suggest that a part of your Lenten discipline is to pray for the leaders of the nations and for those in authority at all levels of government. Pray that they will remember that they have been elected by the people to serve the people. Not every country has the luxury of free and fair elections, and I pray that those oppressive systems will be dismantled. These are troubling times, but I leave you with the words of Jesus to encourage you: "You will hear of wars and rumours of wars, but see to it that you are not alarmed. Such things must happen, but the end is still to come. Nation will rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom. There will be famines and earthquakes in various places. All these are the beginning of birth pains.

Then you will be handed over to be persecuted and put to death, and you will be hated by all nations because of me. At that time many will turn away from the faith and will betray and hate each other, and many false prophets will appear and deceive many people. Because of the increase of wickedness, the love of most will grow cold, but the one who stands firm to the end will be saved." - Gary

# Palm Sunday

Sunday before Easter. Celebration of Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem. Observed with palm branches, parades, and celebration.



# Maundy Thursday

Thursday before Easter. Commemorates the Last Supper. Often observed with foot washing, stripping of the altar, and overnight prayer vigil to keep watch with Jesus in the garden.



# Good Friday

Friday before Easter. Most solemn day of the church year. Observes the day Jesus was crucified. Observed by praying the Stations of the Cross and three hours of silent prayer while Jesus was on the cross.



# Holy Saturday

Saturday before Easter. Observes the day Jesus was in the tomb. This is a day of somber reflection, reflecting on what we'd miss in a world without Jesus.



# Easter Sunday

Hallelujah! Christ has risen! This day we celebrate the resurrection of Jesus. Sing hallelujahs and celebrate with great joy.






### **Pastoral Care in the Parish**

### NEWS FROM THE DUNBARS



We have continued with our donation of \$1,000 each year to support the Dunbar family, who are working in Cambodia -

Neill and Rebekah Dunbar, Jonathan (14), Aaron (12) and Emily (9)

Neill and Rebekah answered the call to join the Church in Cambodia. They began their ministry in Melbourne in 2018 attending the E-month Australian CMC training programme to propose

attending the 5-month Australian CMS training programme to prepare them for cross-cultural mission in Cambodia. They are now integrating into the life of the Anglican Church in Cambodia and their children (Jonathan, Aaron & Emily) are attending HOPE International School. They plan to be involved long-term with the life and ministry of the international and Khmer congregations. Cambodia is a youthful nation with a rapidly rising urban population and rate of development. Still in recovery from its recent turbulent past, this predominantly Buddhist nation is in desperate need of the Good News of Jesus. Language study has been their main priority. They spent time in New Zealand during 2022. On their return to Cambodia in September 2022 they became involved in a church plant in their part of the city. This includes a live-in dormitory situation where young men from the provinces can come to Phnom Penh for work/study and have a place to stay which will look after them.

Neill's main role is the pastoral care of the guys as well as to discern ways to link between the dormitory and the Khmer church.

In 2024 we sent \$1,500 to support them, much of which was raised at a fun 'Jokes and Junk Food' evening.

Items for sale are always welcome for this fundraiser — baking, jams, fruit, vegetables, books, trinkets, etc, etc


Our support for Neil and Rebekah Dunbar and their children Jonathan, Aaron and Emily is by way of our sales table, donations, and a Mission Evening during the year.
